

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Student Success Story: Mayra Chavez



Mayra Chavez was born in Chico, California and, later after her family moved to Dixon and then Woodland, she attended Dixon High School for her 9th - 11th grade years and graduated from Pioneer High School 2014. Her parents immigrated from Michoacán, Mexico. The oldest of four siblings, she has two younger brothers and one sister and is the first in her family to go to college. She was a migrant student—her family would travel back and forth from Mexico to California. Throughout her K-12 education, she attended 17 different schools. Her father worked in the agricultural fields and her mother worked in migrant camp centers. Her parents instilled in her the importance of responsibility, hard work, and dedication.

Mayra shared that the teachers, counselors, and principal she formed strong connections with at Pioneer High School played an important role in helping her believe she could succeed in college. Mayra first attended the California State University, Sacramento for one year but decided she wanted to be closer to home. She began attending WCC in spring 2015 and has attended continuously, including summers, since that time. She will earn her Associates degree in Human Development in fall 2016 and will graduate in Spring 2017.

She hopes to transfer to UC Davis for the fall 2017 semester and would like to work in the postsecondary education field. Her advice for new students: "Seek out relationships with teachers, counselors, and people who can help guide you." She encourages new students to join organizations or clubs and to get involved at the college. She says being involved helps "keep you focused." She emphasizes the importance of meeting with a counselor early to "develop a clear plan for you want to do." Mayra attributes her success at WCC to her involvement with programs like TRIO. The academic advising, workshops, and university field trips helped her figure out what she wanted to do and how to get there. She advises students to not be afraid to ask questions.

Mayra has also made a special contribution to the Woodland Community College campus as one of the college's first Student Ambassadors, a program established in Spring 2016 to develop student leaders, increase student engagement, and outreach to the community. Joann Ramirez, WCC's Student Engagement and Outreach Specialist, who helps oversee the Student Ambassador program, states that Mayra is "an exemplary student and Student Ambassador. She's a great example of student success at WCC and a wonderful role model for students."

Supplemental Instruction: An Innovative Way to Support Student Success

Woodland Community College (WCC) staff at all three locations, Woodland, Lake County Campus (LCC), and Colusa County Campus (CCC), have been working hard to provide more innovative ways to support student learning. In addition to the tutoring services offered at these sites, the Student Success Center at Woodland and the Learning Resource Center at LCC have launched a new student service program – Supplemental Instruction (SI). SI is an interactive, academic program that incorporates hands-on learning activities for students enrolled in specific courses. Woodland and LCC now offer SI for subjects such as math, English, and biology. Courses that are affiliated with SI offer ongoing, weekly SI sessions that deliver course material in fun and engaging ways.

Supplemental Instruction was founded in 1973 by Deanna Martin (Arendale, 2002) to offer assistance to college students enrolled in courses which had proven to be challenging. Once these courses are identified, students who have already taken and excelled in the course are selected and trained in teaching methodology. These qualified students are known as SI leaders and are responsible for facilitating 50-minute SI sessions 3-4 times a week to students who are enrolled in SI-linked courses. These sessions are designed to correspond with the course content and act as a *supplement* to the teaching strategies and learning environment students experience in the classroom.

SI places emphasis on collaborative activities that allow students to apply their understanding of certain concepts and create new meaning. SI activities provide students the opportunity to process what they have learned by participating in games or activities that require them to reproduce information by first constructing their own understanding of it and then applying it in fun and engaging ways. One SI Leader, Steve Ingraham, explains how he uses activities to facilitate learning for Math 52: “So far, we have explored rational expressions by playing games like Bingo, Wheel of Fortune, Battleship, and Tic Tac Toe. Introducing an element of fun to the classroom makes learning less like work and more like play.”

Collaborative learning is infused into the SI structure by centralizing small group learning activities where students are not just engaging in stimulating games or tasks, but are thinking critically along with their peers in order to problem-solve more effectively. Through such interaction with their peers, students develop strong scholar behaviors that they then apply to other courses and their professional lives. One instructor of an SI-linked course, Cay Strobe, notes “Having an SI leader in my classrooms has been a powerful resource. The leaders motivate my students, model strong academic habits, come up with creative lessons that support what we're working on in class, and share student success resources with students. I wish I could have SI in all of my classes!”

Within only the first two months of launching SI in fall 2016, WCC and LCC have collectively recorded over 300 student visits for SI. Because of its unique learning structure, SI has become nationally recognized for its impact on student success and retention. Historically, data has shown those who attend four or more SI sessions generally achieve an entire letter grade higher in GPA than those who do not attend. Thus, encouraging students to attend SI more frequently or bringing SI into more classrooms ultimately means greater success for WCC and LCC students. 


OPEN ENROLLMENT POLICY

All courses, regardless of where offered, are open to members of the public who are otherwise eligible for admission, with the following exceptions:

- Courses that are specifically exempted by statute, including “impacted” allied health programs (Rad Tech, ADN, Psych Tech);
- Courses closed by maximum enrollment of students by the “priority registration” policy;
- Courses with academic requisites that restrict enrollment of academically unqualified students; and
- Courses with content that would be a repeat of a course of equivalent or more advanced coursework previously taken by the student (exceptions require counselor evaluation and Dean approval).

Steps to Enrolling - Pasos Para Inscribirse



WCC Enrollment Process (Matriculation) - Información sobre Matriculación o Inscripción

Matriculation is a process that enhances student access to the California Community Colleges and promotes and sustains the efforts of credit students to be successful in their educational endeavors. The goals of matriculation are to ensure that all students complete their college courses, persist to the next academic term, and achieve their educational objectives through the assistance of the student-direct components of the matriculation process: admissions, orientation, assessment and testing, counseling, and student follow-up. Here are the steps to follow to become a new student at Woodland Community College.

STEP 1: Apply for Admission

If you have not yet applied for admission to Woodland Community College, please Apply Now! complete the California Community College application (CCCApply) online and submit before continuing to Orientation. After submitting your application for admission, you will receive an email message with the important steps to follow to become a WCC student. A WebAdvisor account will be activated within 20-30 minutes after you complete your application for admission. This account will allow you to complete the Online Orientation.

STEP 2: Complete the Online Orientation

Before taking the online orientation, you will need to look up your WebAdvisor User ID. Your WebAdvisor User ID is the first initial of your last name (capitalized) followed by your 7 digit student ID number (i.e. L0123456). If you do not know your 7 digit student ID number, you can retrieve your [WebAdvisor User ID here](#) by clicking on the "Look it up here" link under "What is MyCampus Key Login?" NOTE: If you did not provide a social security number in your OpenCCC application, you will need to visit the Admissions & Records office to receive your student ID number.

Once you have your WebAdvisor User ID, [access the online orientation here](#), and enter your WebAdvisor User ID and password. If this is your first time logging into your WebAdvisor account, your default password will be your birth date in mmddyy format. For example, if you were born on January 1, 1994, your password will be 010194.

STEP 3: Complete College Placement/Assessment Test

After completion of the online orientation quiz, call the WCC Admissions & Records Office at (530) 661-5720 to make an appointment to take the Placement/Assessment Test, which evaluates your skills in English, Math, and Reading to enable you and your counselor to choose the right courses for your first semester at WCC. Check the Placement/Assessment Test schedule and location here: <http://wcc.yccd.edu/admissions/assessment.aspx>. Testing is by appointment only. When you complete the placement/assessment test, you will be given your scores and the opportunity to choose the date and time of the required Counseling Session you would like to attend. **NOTE: Childcare is not available. Please make appropriate arrangements prior to testing.**

STEP 4: Attend a Counseling Session

Attend the required Counseling Session for which you were scheduled following completion of the Assessment Test. Be sure to keep your Counseling Session appointment in order to be cleared for registration. With the help of the counselor, you will select the courses in which you will enroll during your first semester at WCC. Call the Counseling Office to schedule a counseling appointment at (530) 661-5703.

STEP 5: Register & Pay Fees

On or after your Priority Registration Date, register and pay your fees online through WebAdvisor. Be sure to observe the TEN DAYS TO PAY rule to avoid being dropped from your courses for nonpayment. If you believe you are eligible for Financial Aid and/or the Board of Governors enrollment fee waiver, apply through the Financial Aid office before registering.

STEP 6: Be sure to attend the first meeting of each of your classes, and best wishes as you begin your studies at Woodland Community College.

Matriculation Exemption:

Certain students, because of their educational background and plans for study, are exempted from Matriculation requirements. If two or more of the following criteria apply to you, please email WCCAdmissionsInfo@yccd.edu stating your full name as entered on your application for admission and your Student ID number, along with the numbers of the **two or more** exemption criteria that apply to you:

1. Have completed an associate or higher degree (verification required – provide a copy of the degree or transcripts)
2. Will be enrolling in performance classes only (e.g. music, drama, physical education activity classes)
3. Enrolling in fewer than six units
4. Not planning to earn a degree or certificate
5. Enrolling in job-skill upgrade, self-improvement or general interest courses
6. Enrolling in classes for which you have previous training, i.e., firefighter taking an E.M.T. class
7. You are planning on enrolling in the Fire Academy
8. Still attending high school and attempting to enroll in a college course(s) through the Concurrent Enrollment program

If you email a request for Matriculation exemption, we will respond with the next steps to follow to register.

CURRENT HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS:

The Yuba Community College District may accept as a Part-time student, eligible high school students who have completed the eighth grade.

See your High School Counselor for details and form.

This special program is permitted under Education Code regulations, and enrollment is limited to the following restrictions.


1. Student must have completed the 8th grade;
2. Student must complete the prerequisites for courses with required prerequisites (i.e., English, math, reading, etc.). The Placement Exam can be taken to demonstrate level. PICTURE I.D. IS REQUIRED.
3. Students should enroll in college level courses (courses numbered 1-99). No Physical Education courses allowed.
4. For charter/home schooled students: Present a grade equivalency certificate documenting grade level achieved; submit copy of the affidavit submitted to the State or County Office of Education to document the student’s involvement in an educational process.
5. **Register starting December 3, 2016 in person.**

According to AP 5020 and AP 5030 high school student’s enrollment and health fees are waived. Exception: High school students in a full-time status are required to pay both enrollment and health fees. (**NOTE:** Concurrently enrolled students do NOT obtain continuing student status (per Education Code) and are not eligible for Web registration.)

High School Students must also follow the enrollment steps above. They also must obtain the Concurrent Enrollment Form from their high school counselor and collect the necessary signatures. This must be done prior to registering.

STEP 1: Get a FSA ID

The Department of Education FSA serves as the electronic signature on the FAFSA and other federal aid documents for students and parents. <http://www.fsaidth.gov>.

STEP 2: Gather your Information

You will need personal information such as your Social Security Number (SSN), driver’s license number, your Alien Registration Number (if you are not a U.S. citizen), and Federal tax information or tax returns (including W-2 information) to complete your FAFSA. Dependent students will also need this information for their parents.

STEP 3: Submit your Application

Woodland Community College Federal School Code is: **041438**. Complete your FREE Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)., or California DREAM Act Application, if cannot submit the FAFSA

HELPFUL HINTS:

- **Save often:** Save your application frequently. If you lose your internet connection, you’ll have a copy of the data you’ve already entered.
- **Get Help:** Click on the ‘Help’ button or stop by your Financial Aid Office.
- **Sign and Submit:** Sign and submit your application. If you are a dependent student, your parents will also need to sign your application. Once you have signed and submitted your application, you will receive a confirmation number.

STEP 4: Receive your Student Aid Report

Once your application is processed you will receive a Student Aid Report. The college will also receive a copy of your report electronically. The college will begin processing your report and send you an email with additional information as needed. Please update any information and provide verification once the college has requested documents.

STEP 5: Receive your Award Notification

You will receive email notification of your award letter availability from the Financial Aid Office. Your WebAdvisor account will have the most current award information. You can print your award letter from your WebAdvisor account.

STEP 6: Receive your Disbursement of Funds

Financial aid funds are disbursed according to the payment schedule posted on the colleges website. Payments begin on a weekly basis, starting the first week of the semester. You must be enrolled and have an award before payment can be made. You must be making satisfactory academic progress to continue receiving financial aid. If you drop your classes you may need to repay funds. Disbursement of funds may be held for several reasons, such as disenrollment, insufficient number of units, academic progress, holds, or missing information.

What else is needed?

Check out the Student Guide to Financial Aid posted on the website for additional information. Complete all the units you are enrolled in, with a 2.00 GPA or higher. Keep your mailing address and phone number current. Contact the Financial Aid Office if you have any questions. **Be sure to frequently check your YCCD email.**

TYPES OF FINANCIAL AID

There are several types of financial aid available to students, including grants, work-study, and scholarships. Financial aid awards are based on eligibility, financial need and the amount of funds available. For additional information, visit the Financial Aid website at www.yccd.edu or stop by the Financial Aid Office located in the 700 Building.

Board of Governors Fee Waiver (BOG)

The BOG Fee Waiver waives enrollment fees (tuition) for students who meet the eligibility requirements. California residents and eligible AB 540 students may apply. Residency and AB 540 eligibility is determined by Admissions and Records.

Federal Grants and Work-Study

Pell Grant:

This grant is awarded to students with financial need based on the student’s Expected Family Contribution (EFC). A student’s EFC may be found on the SAR. The award varies based on the number of units a student is enrolled in each semester. The student must be enrolled in approved courses. A student may not receive Pell grant funds from more than one school at a time. The maximum lifetime eligibility is the equivalent of 6 years of school at full-time enrollment.

Work-Study: These funds are awarded to students who demonstrate financial need and an interest in FWS on the FAFSA application. FWS provides part-time employment on campus. Funds are limited and awarded on a first-come, first-serve basis. Must be enrolled in at least 6 units.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG): These funds are limited and awarded to students who are enrolled in at least 6 units with exceptional financial need as determined by the Financial Aid Office.

Cal Grant

The California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) administers the Cal Grant program. These funds are awarded to California residents who filed a FAFSA or California Dream Act Application and Cal Grant GPA Verification form by the March 2nd or September 2nd deadline and demonstrate financial need.

Students must be enrolled in an approved degree or eligible certificate program and be enrolled in at least 6 units per semester. For additional information, visit the CSAC website at www.csac.ca.gov.

Chafee

The California Chafee Grant is a grant for current or former California foster youth to help pay for college or career and technical training.

To qualify, you must:

- Be a current or former foster youth
- Not have reached your 22nd birthday as of July 1 of the award year
- Have financial need

Full-time Student Success Grant

The Full-Time Student Success Grant (FTSSG) is a supplemental grant program for full-time Cal Grant B recipients. FTSSG encourages students to persist toward their educational goal by maintaining full-time enrollment status.

To qualify, you must:

- Be a CalGrant B recipient
- Enrolled full-time (12 or more units)
- Currently attending a California Community College

Scholarships

A number of scholarships are available through the Yuba Community College District Foundation and through other donors. Scholarships are awarded based upon various criteria, including financial need, grade point average, career goals, and extracurricular activities. Scholarship enrollment requirements vary.

The Foundation Scholarship Application is available online at www.yccd.edu/student/FinancialAid. Other donor sponsored scholarships are posted on the Scholarship Opportunities board located in the Eagle’s Nest.

Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP)

Federal regulations require all students who receive federal financial aid maintain SAP in their course of study, regardless of whether they have ever applied for or received financial aid. Yuba Community College District, through the Financial Aid Office, **monitors that progress using Quantitative, Qualitative, and Maximum Time Frame criteria.**

All standards are checked at the end of each semester during the academic year for all the periods a student is enrolled.

Quantitative: A student is required to successfully complete at least 70% of all attempted units each semester and cumulative to ensure an acceptable pace of progression toward completion of their selected educational goal within a maximum time frame.

Qualitative: A student is required to maintain a Grade Point Average of at least 2.0 for each semester enrolled in and cumulative.

Maximum Time Frame: Time frame is used to determine the maximum number of units for which a student may receive financial aid for their educational goal. Remedial, transfer and ESL credits are included in the calculation of maximum time frame.

- Associate Degree: maximum allowed is 90 units
- Transfer: maximum allowed is 90 units
- Certificate: maximum allowed is 45 units

Failure to meet SAP standards will place a student in warning or terminated status. Students should read the complete SAP policy contained in the Financial Aid Guide available at www.yccd.edu.

If a student drops classes before the next disbursement of their financial aid, their second disbursement will be adjusted to reflect their new enrollment status.

If a student drops or withdraws from all of their classes prior to completing 60% of the term, it will affect their eligibility for financial aid and could result in the student having to repay all or a portion of the financial aid received.

Students are notified of their SAP status via their student YCCD email. It is important students activate their student email account and check their email frequently.

BankMobile

Woodland Community College, as part of the Yuba Community College District, has changed the way we disburse financial aid funds to our students. Students will be issued a My Yuba Card and offered three payment options:

- BankMobile Debit Card (My Yuba Card)
- Direct Deposit into your bank account, or
- Receive your check by (snail) mail

Students will receive a selection kit issued by BankMobile during the first term they register in a class. Look for the kit to be delivered in a green envelope shown below.



FEES & REFUNDS

The enrollment fee is subject to change and is established by the State Legislature. If fees are increased by the State Legislature after publication of the schedule, students will be billed for the additional fees. **All fees are due to the college at the time of enrollment.** No future enrollments may take place until all debts are paid. Fees may be paid by cash, check, VISA, MasterCard, Discover, ATM, or fee waiver. **Students can be dropped from their courses if fees are not paid within 10 days from time of enrollment** (see 10 Days to Pay Policy).

REFUNDS:

Deadline for Short Term Classes:

You ***must*** drop your class by the end of the ***second*** class meeting to receive a refund if the class meets fewer than 30 meeting days. Adds and drops should be processed through WebAdvisor.

If your class has more than 30 meeting days:

- 31-40 days – end of 3rd class meeting
- 41-50 days – end of 4th class meeting
- 51-60 days – end of 5th class meeting

Deadline for Full Term SPRING Classes: February 3, 2017

Refund dates VARY for each short-term class. See the refund deadline information for short-term classes. Contact the Registration Office for more information on the refund dates in EACH short-term class.

A \$10.00 processing fee is charged for refunds. Students must make a request for a fee refund through the on-line request form in WebAdvisor. If fees were paid by check, there will be a 3 week waiting period before the refund can be processed. For fees paid by credit card, the refund will be credited back to the original card used. Please allow up to four weeks processing time for cash and credit card refunds. E-mail cashier@yccd.edu for the status of your refund.

RETURN TO TITLE 4 (R2T4). Students who drop completely or withdraw from classes prior to completing 60% of the term may be required to repay any unearned federal funds to Yuba College or to the Department of Education, per Federal regulations.

10 Days to Pay

Students have 10 days to pay for their classes from the time of registration. Students who have not paid their fees within 10 days may be dropped for non-payment.

To avoid being dropped from your classes take one of the following steps:

- 1.) Pay for your classes in full; **OR**
- 2.) Complete a Board of Governors Fee Waiver (BOGW) with Financial Aid **PRIOR** to registration; **OR**
- 3.) Sign up for a payment plan online through WebAdvisor. **Students are responsible for making payment arrangements.** Those who do not make payments may be dropped from one or more classes. Once you have registered you will be able to see your status in MyCampus Portal and through NelNet’s website: <http://mypaymentplan.com>.
- 4.) **IMPORTANT: Students are responsible for any fees incurred and grades received. It is the student’s responsibility to drop classes by the State-mandated refund deadline to avoid fee obligations and they must be aware of all other published deadlines. (Once classes begin, non-attendance or non-payment does not release the student from his/her responsibility and may result in student fee debt and failing grades being awarded).**

Make sure your fees are paid so your classes are secure before the term starts.

American Opportunity (Hope) and/or Lifetime Learning Tax Credits Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997

In accordance with the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997, the District will send information required by the IRS to eligible students. Please check with your tax preparer to determine if you are eligible to take advantage of this tax credit.




Loss of BOG Fee Waiver and Enrollment Priority California Community College’s Chancellor Office

Students qualifying for a fee waiver are required to identify, upon enrollment, a degree, certificate, or transfer goal and meet Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) standards.



Adding a Course

Students can add classes through WebAdvisor through the **last day to add** for open classes. If a class is closed or waitlisted, permission of the instructor is required. Students with an ADD FORM signed by the instructor must register in person at the Admissions and Records Office by **February 3, 2017** for full-semester classes.

Dropping a Course

Students can drop a class through WebAdvisor or at Admissions and Records according to the **deadline dates** on the calendar on page 2 and page 5. Be aware of deadlines and meet with a counselor if you are unsure about dropping a course. If you receive Financial Aid, make sure you discuss this with Financial Aid before dropping as it will affect your Financial Aid status. Dropping a course is the **STUDENT’S RESPONSIBILITY**. Never assume that you will be dropped by an instructor.

Attendance

Attend the first class meeting of each class. If you can’t attend, notify your instructor in advance. Without prior notification, you MAY be dropped and waitlisted students may be admitted in your place. A student MUST be registered in order to attend classes. It is YOUR responsibility to drop by the deadline to avoid paying fees or receiving a grade.

AB 540 and AB 2000 - Non-Resident Tuition Exemption

Non-residents who attended a California high school for three years and graduated from a California high school may apply for the AB 540or AB 2000 California Non-Resident Tuition Exemption. An official copy of the student’s high school transcript must be presented when submitting the California Nonresident Tuition Exemption Form, available at the Admissions and Records Office or from the website at <https://wcc.yccd.edu/admissions/forms>. Non-residents who qualify for this exemption are not required to pay the non-resident tuition fee.

Non-Resident Tuition

Non-residents are required to pay a tuition fee in addition to the fees paid by California residents. Non-resident active duty military personnel stationed in California, and their dependents, are eligible for a tuition exemption, paying the same fees as California residents. Contact the Admissions and Records Office for more information.

Pass/No-Pass Grading

Some courses allow students to choose between letter grading (A, B, C, D, F) or Pass/No Pass (P/NP) grading for the course. The choice must be made by the student by submitting a Pass/No Pass form to the Admissions and Records office by **February 24, 2017** for full-term Fall classes. Short course deadlines are listed on page 5. Choosing Pass/No Pass grading may affect degree, certificate, and transfer requirements. Discuss the consequences with a counselor prior to making this selection.

Wait Lists

If you place yourself on a waitlist, be sure to continuously check the waitlist through WebAdvisor to see if you have been added. When space becomes available, waitlisted students are automatically enrolled in waitlisted classes. However, this automatic process ends when classes begin. After that you must attend the **first class meeting** to request permission from the instructor to enroll. If the instructor gives you permission to add the course, you must take the signed ADD FORM to the Admissions and Records Office by **February 3, 2017** (for full-term classes) to officially enroll and be permitted to attend the course. Short course deadlines are listed on page 5.

Advisory Skills for Entry Level Courses

Many courses numbered between 1 and 99 carry credit/units which apply toward the associate degree and require college-level language and/or computation skills for successful participation. The courses are identified in the catalog and schedule with an “(L)”, “(M)”, or “(L)(M)” in the course description.

Recommended Skills Criteria for Associate Degree Applicable Courses

Students may meet the requirements for the (L) courses by:

- 1. Completing Reading 70 with a grade of “C” or better, or being concurrently enrolled in Reading 70, or achieving a reading placement level of “3004” or higher; or
- 2. Achieving an English placement level of “1003” or higher, or by achieving a grade of “C” or better in English 105, or concurrent enrollment in English 105.

The (M) designation means that the content of the course is such that the student must have college-level math skills to successfully participate in the course. Students may meet the requirements for (M) courses by: Achieving a math placement level of “2003” or higher, or by completing with a “C” or better, Math 110, Math 111, or General Business 100; or by concurrent enrollment in Math 110, Math 111, or General Business 100.


Residency

- Residency is determined by the laws of the State of California.
- California residents are those who have maintained legal residency status in California for one year and a day PRIOR to the first day of the semester.
- Non-Resident students interested in establishing California residency should understand that physical presence, proof of intent and financial independence must be met one full year and a day prior to the day before the semester begins. Residency will not be confirmed until the student provides documentation to meet the above criteria. The law requires that the student show no contrary intent, that is, he/she must not have maintained residence status in his/her former state (i.e., driver’s license, taxes, car registration, etc.) The burden of proof rests with the student.
- Non-Residents who attended a California High School for three years or more and graduated from a California high school may be eligible for AB 540 or AB 2000 Non-Resident tuition. If you qualify, you may be eligible for the BOGW enrollment fee waiver. If you did, please request a California Non-Resident tuition exemption request from the Admissions and Records Office or locate it on-line under Admissions Forms. You will need to provide official high school transcripts and follow the instructions listed on the form to see if you qualify.

WOODLAND CAMPUS SCHEDULE


WCC’s “New” Student Success Center

The new Student Success Center located in the 800 building is a reflection of Woodland Community College’s dedication to collaboration and to cultivating a student-centered campus. The Student Success Center itself is conglomeration of learning centers that were once located in various areas on campus. Before the relocation, students went to the second floor of 800 building for writing and math tutoring, the first floor for math drop-in assistance, and the 600 building for help from the Mathematics, Engineering, and Science Achievement (MESA) program. Now, the new Student Success Center is home to all of these learning resources – allowing students to receive a holistic learning experience in one location. Students can receive tutoring for math and science in the Tutoring Center, writing and reading tutoring in the Reading and Writing Center (RAWC, pronounced “rock”) and other areas related to Science, Technology, Engineering, or Mathematics (STEM) in the MESA Center. Students are already talking about the impact the Student Success Center has had on their academic careers. These students’ stories delineate the power behind the services at the Student Success Center:




Cesar Tapia: *I come from the community of Williams, CA. During my first two semesters of college, I found myself struggling to pass basic level science classes. I decided to join MESA to take advantage of the tutoring services but, in the end, it turned out to be a life changing experience.*

I realized that MESA was more than just tutoring services or a place to study. MESA helped me succeed in my college career and beyond. I became a resourceful student, which was an important foundation in attaining my undergraduate degree at CSU, Sacramento. The skills I developed during my time in the MESA program have enabled me to seek out and conquer new challenges. Because of this, I have been offered and accepted a full-ride scholarship from the San Luis Potosi Institute of Scientific Research and Technology and will be pursuing my postgraduate studies in Applied Geology.



Sandra Castillo: *The Reading and Writing Center has been a great help during my educational journey. The center has helped me become a better writer by teaching me life-long strategies that I am able to use, not only in my English class, but also in all of my other classes. By practicing and regularly applying all the strategies that the center taught me, I have also become a better student. For example, one technique I use when reading my textbooks is SQ4R. By using this technique, I have increased my reading efficiency as well as my overall passion for reading. It also helped me concentrate and build my confidence in the ability to take tests.*

I also received help from the staff on a personal level. They reached out to me and helped me realize my full potential. Through their mentorship and support I discovered my passion for writing. Since then, I have since also become an English tutor and am now pursuing a degree in English, so that I can continue to help students the way the RAWC has helped me.



Jesus Chavarin: *As a re-entry student, one of the challenges I encountered was learning math all over again. I started off in math 111, then went onto math 50, then math 52 and eventually worked my way up to calculus 2. But the road has not been easy. I could not imagine getting this far without the faithful and never ending help of Tutoring Center's staff and tutors. They have always been more than willing and eager to help me and my fellow classmates with any challenges we have faced. They have not only helped with math problems, but supported me and my classmates in dealing with pre-exam stress and finals.*

As a former business owner for over 20 years and having to deal with public relations, I can strongly say having the Student Success Center as part of WCC is an essential asset for our students and our community.

The establishment of the Student Success Center and its additional academic services has already proven to increase access for our students. Last year, the various tutoring centers served a total of 504 students during fall 2015. However, within just the first month of the new Student Success Center, 514 students have been served and a projected 2000 students will receive tutoring services by the end of fall 2016. These numbers are representative of the power behind the collective and is a testament to WCC’s efforts in being student-first.



This year Pierce High School students are able to take college level agriculture, science, counseling, and business classes, while Williams High School students are getting a head-start on their college agriculture course work. It is amazing to see so many high school students around our district take seriously the idea of going to college while still in high school. Imagine - some of these students will graduate from high school and transfer to college as sophomores or juniors already! Colusa County administrators, teachers, and students alike are thrilled to be partnering with Woodland Community College in this endeavor. Colusa County Campus of Woodland Community College is committed to providing rigorous educational opportunities to our youth that will result in more successful transitions to higher education and future employment opportunities for our communities. The faculty providing instruction on the high school campuses teach the same curriculum and meet the same high standards and minimum qualifications that all community college instructors must meet, regardless of where they teach.
