Allen to the Vice President hiring committee. **Siwabessy Background:** The original plan was due to the CCCCO by 5. **Student Equity & Achievement** June 30, 2019 and requires Senate President signature. (SEA) Plan (First Read) Pierro Dean Martinez, Dean Siwabessy, and Senate VP Pierro are working on this document. The WCC Senate had a Information/Discussion first read during a previous meeting and provided feedback. With the extension the Senate will not be asked to sign off on this plan until early Fall 2019. Objective: Provide the senate an update on the progress of the SEA Plan development Discussion/Decision: 1. Dean Siwabessy reported that feedback was incorporated from WCC employees into the original plan, particularly around the activities listed and less so regarding the goals. The narratives, such as the executive summary, are still being drafted and those will be sent to the senate in the fall prior to submission to the state. The document is due to have Board signoff by September 30. Clark asked how much the document will change over the summer and whether it would be necessary for the senate to give it two full reads. Dean Siwabessy responded that the feedback would be appreciated from the senate. The senate does not need to endorse the plan today. Clark asked where things stand with regard to assessment of dual enrollment. Dean Siwabessy replied that this would be a high priority going forward, but that this has still not been completed. There are some numbers that still need to be updated in terms of transfer and graduation classifications, as senators pointed out that a few of the transfer rates for specific populations appeared to be underreported. Howerton noted that this will be included in convocation and faculty will have another opportunity to review the document. The senate will also have two more reads in the fall prior to submission. The SEA Plan is due on June 30. Howerton replied that the senate will have to have the Executive Team sign off over the summer and then report back to the senate in the fall. Clark lamented the fact that this is left to a summer signoff when input may still be needed from faculty prior to the submission date of June 30. Howerton expressed frustration that the Chancellor's office provided a timeline that makes it difficult for the senate to do a more complete vetting of the document. Statement Read by Melissa Moreno:

With clear direction around roles in completing part-time faculty evacuations, information from the recent HR training, and verification of the process directly from Senate President Howerton and Dean Chahal, I assisted and cooperated with Dean Wylie in conducting faculty evaluation(s). Teaching courses according to course outline of records (COR) matter. This is central to the Senate. I am here to discuss the issue of the Lake County Dean not taking into consideration the fact that a course was not taught according to the COR and overlooked serious student concerns noted in evaluations. The student comments were regarded as reflecting the "kind of students" that Lake Campus has, which is an insult. Our students experience should not be overlooked. Also the course includes "history" in its title and the COR provides a chronology of historical events that define ideas of race and ethnicity in the United States. The course was designed by Yuba College History Professor Travis Smith. At WCC the course was cross listed in History and Ethnic Studies, and eventually it was un-cross listed and adopted by Ethnic Studies. The COR has only changed slightly, but not much. Our students receive history credit for this course along with fulfilling other requirements. Yet, the Dean at the Lake Campus ignored the fact that the faculty of instruction did not follow it and explicitly indicated in the faculty evaluation conference that they did not and would not teach the course in chronological order as a history course. This was witnessed by the WCC Dean Chahal.

In addition there is a required, and I emphasize "required" and not "equivalent" textbook, that is written by an Ethnic Studies scholar trained in History. Yet when I raised the concern that the assigned faculty was not using it as the required and main textbook of the course it was ignored by the Dean. I raised this concern before the course began, when the course started, in the evaluation, and in the faculty conference. This among the other concerns with student evaluations and the disregard for the COR were not taken into account when the dean conducted another evaluation. The evaluated faculty has the right to respond in writing and to conduct a "self evaluation." Yet, it does not seem like a self evaluation took place rather the Dean conducted a second interview. As of now the Dean's evaluation summary contradicts the written response of the faculty. It is unclear if he intends to replace my original evaluation with his or submit both, and if the faculty will continue teaching in Ethnic Studies in the fall. I have asked him for clarification about this and other items but he has not responded.

I have been asked by our VP to meet with him and the President about assisting Dean Wylie in the evaluation, but without my immediate supervisor Dean Chahal being present. I ask Senate to encourage administration to allow her, as well as my Senate Rep, to be present. Dean Chahal was part of the process, was present at the faculty evaluation conference, is familiar with Ethnic Studies, and knows of all the evaluations that I have conducted over the last 10 years.

With strong support from Trustee Ortiz and Faculty Rodriguez, I have created the Ethnic Studies program and have tended to the program and faculty evaluations with care. Although I have been told it is not a disciplinary meeting, it seems to be a meeting to discuss a disputed evaluation in Ethnic Studies--an academic discipline and program that the VP and President know little about—and this is deeply concerning. Can Senate to help me request that Dean Chahal, and my senate rep, be able to attend the meeting to discuss evaluation process and let me know if Dean Wylie can be held accountable to what he late stated in the evaluation summary even if the form is not signed and there are contradictions?
