Proposal for Revitalizing the Multicultural Enrichment Center & Programming

Context:

The Ethnic Studies Program Review in spring of 2020 and previous years recognized and recorded the significant work that the Ethnic Studies Department created through community service projects and by working closely with the Diversity Committee. Ethnic Studies created and led the Multicultural Center's cultural programming, *Si Se Puede* Chicanx Latinx Graduation, and *Bienvenida* Orientation to advocate and educate the campus and Woodland community about diversity and equity, as well as retention and persistence of Ethnic Studies and all students on campus.

The College leadership recommends releasing Ethnic Studies Faculty, including Professor Moreno, from oversight responsibilities and activities that have been under the umbrella of the Ethnic Studies Department and Chicana/o Studies program faculty and students. The recommendations are as follows:

- Ethnic Studies Department and faculty holding no oversight of responsibilities and activities related to the Multicultural Center's cultural programming, Si Se Puede Chicanx Latinx Graduation, and Bienvenida bilingual orientation
- Institutionalizing the oversight of all these activities that will be made available to Ethnic Studies and all program and students
- > Clear administrative assignment and oversight of all these activities
- Ongoing Budget allocation of all these activities
- Institutional visibility and ownership of all these activities
- Program review status of all these activities
- Release Ethnic Studies full-time faculty from the basic function and responsibility of regularly sponsoring cultural programming by working closing with the Diversity Committee
- Encourage Ethnic Studies to continue leading academic cultural events and community service learning project as indicated in the job announcement, with the institutional and financial equity support of the College and District and

The following oversight and activities will be decoupled from the Ethnic Studies Department

- 1. Multicultural Enrichment Center
- 2. Bienvenida Orientation
- 3. Si Se Puede Chicanx Latinx Graduation

Vice President Esquivel-Swinson and Dean Reed have been asked to lead the initiative to formalize institutional commitment to the Multicultural Center's cultural programming, *Si Se Puede* Chicanx Latinx Graduation, and *Bienvenida* bilingual orientation.
