- 1. Who are the students we serve <u>now</u> and who will our <u>future</u> students be?
- 2. What are the needs of our <u>current</u> students and what will students' needs be in the <u>future</u>?
- 3. Do our <u>current</u> delivery systems serve student needs? Will they serve students' <u>future</u> needs?
- 4. How can we best serve the educational needs of the population in our service area?
- 5. What resources (e.g., technology, facilities) and practices will best ensure equitable access and outcomes for our students?

Mission Statement:

- Staff/faculty in attendance overall liked the themes shared but they noted that while we have 3 campuses we need to have COHESION and one of the ways towards that end is to NOT have 3 mission statements. Our mission statement can/should address the 3 campuses that we serve but be ONE statement (UNITED CAMPUSES).
 - Upon review of the themes shared they pointed out the following:
 - Excellent educational programs
 - Diversity
 - Equity
 - Inclusion
 - Meeting educational goals
 - Economic development
 - Student centered
 - They noted that the mission statement could be strengthened if we include/add language that is more inclusive/global;
 - Highlighting responsible citizens
 - Leadership
 - Cultural responsiveness (ISLO's)
 - Explicitly noting INCLUSIVITY
 - Adding: Building on human potential (developing/adding) to the student experience to help them develop/realize their potential.
 - Synergy
 - Connectivity
 - Lifelong learning
 - Supportive environment

Vision Statement:

- They agree that the vision statement should be practical and purposeful; some of the takeaways from the discussion include:
 - o Scale
 - o Focus
 - Adaptability/Responsiveness
 - Distinguishing from flexibility; acknowledging that the institution seeks to build a culture that responds to the needs in a 'two-way street' where the needs of the constituents are heard/seen-
 - Addressing the changing needs within our means/resources (being realistic of what we can and can't do based on existing structures.
 Challenges/struggles of the institution/system @ large lens.
 - Suggested: AVENUE OF UPWARD MOBILITY as part of or the vision statement itself as concise/actionable words can be more powerful than lengthy statements.
 - Also noted, not funneling talent out of our communities but ENRICHING them by providing services/education/resources to build on what we have.
 - Preparing students with skills inside and outside the classroom to become;
 - More employable
 - Providing them with more opportunities for experiential learning
 - Providing more problem-solving skills in our curriculum
 - Creating/acknowledging intersection of success with community engagement is needed.
 - Sustainability (global/local labor market and higher ed)
 - Removal of known barriers; providing access
 - Los Rios CC District noted as an example.

Values:

- While they agree that the principles/behaviors listed are important it is suggested that each is clearly defined;
 - There is a need to provide context/conceptualize the 'values' as they relate to the institution and what we do.
 - The 'overuse' or lack of context to some of the words is counterproductive.
 - Integrity
 - Equity
 - Open
 - Transparent
 - They suggest that the following are added:
 - Uniqueness/contributions (recognizing the strength in our students, staff, faculty's uniqueness and how these can/do contribute to the institution/community).
 - Culturally responsive
 - Engaging
 - Accountability (for all)

- Collaboration
- Partnerships (recognizing students as partners)
 - Actionable statements are preferred.

Additional takeaways;

- Recognizing that we serve an array of students-
 - New & Returning
 - Those seeking a degree, certification, training, dual enrollment, general interest in education and how this impacts their educational/college experience-
 - Needs, expectations, challenges, motivations.
- Recognizing that we are in a rural service area (infrastructure, options, resources)
- Recognizing importance of building partnerships with our community, K-12 partners.
 - Suggested/inquired about Town Halls with external partners including dual enrollment students.
